ANGELA & ANDREW DIXON

First seen in Wellington only a couple of years ago, these two from Auckland made such an impact that they have been asked back again and again. Angela's album "Taking a Chance" was a finalist in last year's music awards. Her new album "Deceptive Love" has just been released. Not only is their music superb but they also run their own "Impact" recording studio.

JOHN SUTHERLAND

One of the few early revivalist folk performers still kicking up a storm. John came from Aberdeen to New Zealand in 1964 already steeped in the traditions of Scottish urban music. Playing harmonica and guitar John's tastes in music are varied. He excells in Blues, Calypso, British traditional and contemporary songs, and has even been heard playing American Country music.

DAVE MURPHY and MARG LAYTON

Marg and Dave have performed throughout New Zealand and overseas and have been widely acclaimed as solo performers. Both have travelled to America to the sources of the blues. Marg started singing folk songs and became attracted to spirituals. This led her to the blues where she is acknowledged as being one of New Zealands best. Dave has played blues since he was fifteen but it was in his early twenties that the early finger-style blues became his major love.

DANNY SPOONER

Danny spent many years at sea where he not only learnt a shanty or two, but also the history that lay behind the songs, discovering that the words were the voices of real people telling the stories of their lives. He ended up in Australia – loving the wide open spaces. Swopping songs and stories with others, he is internationally respected as a folklorist both educating and entertaining with voice, concertina and guitar.

MARGARET FARRELLY

Margaret sings traditional and contemporary ballads and quotes her influences as being Frances and Mary Black, Delores Keane and Emmy Lou Harris. She has been a regular performer of acoustic music in Wellington for more than five years and last year released her first album "Once in a blue moon". Margaret is backed by Tony Hillyard on accoustic guitar, Gillian Baynes violin, Kevin Ikin bazouki, Bob Silbery on electric bass and two guests from Palmerston North, Celia Briar on celtic harp and Jenny Incson on pipes.

THE CHAPS

Formed in the latter part of 1990 over some serious coffee and cake the Chaps have rapidly filled the gap between folk and mainstream music. They are **Marcus Turner**, singer, songwriter, multi-instrumentalist and entertainer. **John Dodd**, bass player and songwriter, has played with John Hore-Grenell and Midge Marsden. **Mike Moroney** singer, songwriter, playing guitar, mandolin and accordian has played with Duncdin's "Pog n'Scroggin" band since 1984 and **Dr Hyram Ballard** Geologist, guitar and fiddle player from California, plays folk, country, jazz and rock hammer.

ROBIN BREW

Your compere for this evening, once seen – never forgotten. Robin and his alter ego **Captain Fickletummy** can be seen at concerts and parties wherever children are involved. Himself a shanty singer of renown he can also be remembered as "The Human Jukebox" where his renditions of Everly Brothers favourites are bound to bring tears of reminiscence to your eyes.
