
THE FEST REQUESTS

THE AR - KAY CAJUN BAND



The Ar - Kay Cajun Band was formed in 1997, when its founder Richard Klein emigrated to Wellington from America, via England and Italy. Richard heard his first Cajun tune at the age of seventeen at a folk festival in Vermont and for him it was a case of love at first tune. It was the combination of vocals and fiddle by the same person that really blew him away although it wasn't until 1978 that he learnt his first Cajun song.

For Richard, who's been playing fiddle since the age of fourteen, Cajun music is best summed up by the popular Louisiana saying "Laissez les bonnnes temps roulez" (let the good times roll) and this is pretty much sums up what they try to achieve as a band.

The members of the band bring a mixture of styles to the group. Richard Klein is the fiddler and lead vocalist; Winnie Winston (pedal steel guitar) adds a driving electric, country sound typical of many of the 1950s Cajun groups; Simon Burgess (mandolin, vocals, triangle) has an uncanny ability to sing harmonies in the key of A; and Kevin Ikin (guitar and triangle) and Bob Silbery add solid rhythm learnt by playing together in bands for years. For this festival the band is joined by Red McKelvie on Cajun diatonic accordion and Liz Merton on fiddle.

The Ar - Kay Cajun Band's feature concert is at 4.30 pm on Saturday in the Maire Hall. 'The Origins of Cajun music" workshop with Richard, Red and Murray McKay is on Saturday at 11.30 am in the Fletcher Hall (bring instruments). The band will also appear in the "Best of Festival" concert.

BOB BICKERTON



Specialising in Celtic Music, Bob has performed at most major concert venues and folk festivals around New Zealand in the last eighteen years.

Bob is a multiinstrumentalist and a performance will include vocals, guitar, flute, Uilleann pipes, whistle, harp and mandola.

Bob's performance repertoire includes contemporary and traditional songs from Ireland and Scotland, foot tapping dance tunes and plaintive airs, self-penned songs and tunes, all presented in a warm and humorous way.

Bob has been involved in the music industry for more than twenty years, including ten years as the general manager of the Dunedin Sinfonia, followed by a period as the manager of the Nelson School of Music. He was the founder of the School of Celtic Music and a founder and convenor of The New Zealand Uilleann Pipers Association.

Bob was a founder member of the popular Irish group Gael Force and his current band Flying Feet is kept busy in the Nelson region playing for barndances. His debut CD "Music in the Glen" was released in 1996 and was a finalist in the folk section of the New Zealand Recording Industry Awards for that year.

Bob will present a workshop for children in the Nelson Lounge at 11.00 am on Saturday morning and he and Evey McAuliffe will feature in a concert in the Maire Hall at 10.30 am on Sunday, as well as in the Best of the Festival concert on Sunday night.

CASADH

Casadh is an Irish word that means to twist, to return and to change, a good description of the band's common purpose, which is to keep Irish music alive by expressing it in new and creative ways.

Casadh have been playing together as a band for little more than a year but in that time they've gained a high degree of exposure through weekly appearances at the Claddagh and Muddy Farmer pubs in Auckland and their appearance at the Gordonton Folk Festival at Easter.

Although only a three piece unit, Casadh's members play a bewildering variety of instruments such as whistle, flute,



bodhran, Uilleann pipes, fiddle, mandolin and a strange Indian harmonium called a shruti box. An undoubted feature of the band is the unique vocal style of Jo Taylor. Add to this the skilled tune playing of Liz Anderson and Jono Lonie and you have a group much greater than the sum of its parts.

Casadh in concert have drive and conviction and a style of their own which makes them much more than "just another Irish pub band". Come along to their concert at 12.00 noon on Saturday in the Maire Hall and see for yourself. Casadh will also present a bodhran workshop in the Fletcher Hall on Saturday at 2.30 pm.

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FLORABUNDA

FLORABUNDA the best traditional singing exauisite cappella three-part harmonies from three of the country's finest traditional singers, Beverley Young, Pat Bowley and Clare Senior. The group was born in the late 1960s



when Beverley started singing with Pat and her husband Colin at the Devonport Folk Music Club. Following Colin's death in 1984, Beverley and Pat continued singing together with Pat and Colin's daughter, Clare, taking the third part.

Together they have amassed an impressive resume, singing at many festivals and folk clubs, appearing in the TVNZ documentary *Strictly a Cappella* and singing for another documentary, *Hoots Mon*, about Scottish emigration to New Zealand.

Florabunda has entertained at many private functions, from sculpture exhibitions to graduation parties, and was featured this year at the New Zealand National Poetry Awards, at Government House in Auckland.

The group contributed to Beverley Young's two albums and is now working on a CD on its own right. Last year Beverley, Pat and Clare toured Britain and sang at the Holmforth and Whitby festivals.

All three members of Florabunda are soloists in their own right with a variety of instrumental skills which make occasional appearances in their performances. Their wide range of musical interests and sophisticated arranging skills has produced a repertoire which is never predictable......but always enjoyable.

Florabunda can be enjoyed in concert in the Maire Hall at 3.00 pm on Saturday afternoon and again in the final concert on Sunday night. They are also presenting a vocal workshop at 12 noon on Sunday again in the Maire Hall.

KAYTE & THE BARFLIES



Kayte Edwards' musical career started at the age of seventeen when she bought a guitar with her first pay and went to her first folk festival

Until she went overseas in the early 80s Kayte was a regular face at festivals where she learnt to play guitar by asking questions and taking part in many informal lessons.

On her return to New Zealand in her late twenties she and her partner travelled the length and breadth of the country. During this period Kayte was exposed to other musical influences such as the garage bands of New Plymouth, rock and country bands in Golden Bay and blues bands in Wellington.

In 1994 Kayte settled in Wellington and met swing guitarist Alan Witham. Their first - very memorable - studio experience was the music for a video on safe work practices for the Prostitutes' Collective, which called for some raunchy blues. She and Alan have been playing great swing ever since.

The experience of contributing to the Tahora Music Festival 21st anniversary CD led Kayte on to recording her own CD. "Emergenc-ee" was released to favourable reviews in February this year. It covers a lot of musical ground blues, country, swing and folk - and shows Kayte's strong songwriting skills. Her compositions express her feelings about the important things in life, women's issues and having a good time to name a couple.

Kayte will be performing material from her debut CD with The Barflies, who are Alan Witham and Dougal Speir on guitar, George Barris on bass and Jim Lawrie on drums.

Catch their zany mix of blues, swing and country at 3.00 pm on Sunday afternoon in the Maire Hall and in the final concert. Kayte will present a workshop on music for under-5s on Sunday morning in the Nelson Lounge.

MILLENNIUM HIPPIES



Millennium Hippies Mark Laurent and Brenda Liddiard have been together for ten years and between them they've recorded eight albums and also published a book of poetry.

Acoustic music is their "thing" and they're likely to turn up at a gig with an arsenal of guitars, mandolins (and other strange things with strings on). percussion harmonicas. etc. They're both songwriters so the "Hippies" repertoire developed into a fairly eclectic mix of folk, rock, blues, country and gospel.

Mark has been a working musician for 30 years, solo, in bands and duos. He has been a producer/session musician and

has performed on radio and television. Brenda has been performing for over 20 years in Australia and New Zealand, working mainly in duos and bands and also as a session musician.

Together they have toured extensively in New Zealand, Australia and England, performing at music clubs, festivals, house concerts, cafes, schools, fund raisers and churches.

In the past Millennium Hippies have performed at the Taupo Folk Festival, and at the Tahora, Auckland and Gordonton Festivals as well as performing at virtually every major folk club in the country.

Millennium Hippies' feature concert is at 10.30 am on Saturday morning in the Maire Hall and on Sunday Mark and Brenda present a workshop on performance in the Fletcher Hall at 1.00 pm. They will also be appearing in The Best of the Festival concert on Sunday night.

CALLANISH



Callanish is a sociable band from the Manawatu, with a reputation for providing fine Celtic-based music for dancing (and listening) to. From familiar ballads to high-speed jigs and reels. they'll lift your spirits and get your feet tapping.

Callanish are:

Adrienne (Adie) Leng - Piano Accordion, Guitar, Mandolin, Percussion

Following in the footsteps of her Grandad (a noted ceilidh muso) Adie started playing tunes on accordion in 1976 with Dunedin's Ginger Minge Bush Band

Colin Caddick: Uilleann Pipes, Lowland Small-Pipes, Whistle

First heard the Highland Pipes at 4 years old and has had an ongoing love affair with them ever since. Living proof that a man is married to his bagpipes, and lives in sin with his wife.

Vivienne Nicholls: Fiddle, Bodhran

Viv discovered her fiddling tendencies on the Isle of Skye. As a member of the Skye Fiddle and Accordion Club she was soon in demand playing for a local dance band. Now back in Palmerston North she enjoys the band scene again with Callanish.

Catherine Widdup: Vocals, percussion

With a home resounding with music and laughter Cathy could sing the melodies of Eilleen O'Donaghue and John McCormack before she learnt the alphabet. When she and Anne sang at a concert for the anniversary of the potato famine, backed by local musicians the combination worked and Callanish was born.

Anne Andrews: Vocals, percussion

Born in Dublin, Anne grew up with music as a big part of her life. As a child Anne sang and composed her own songs for competitions at music festivals. In 1984 Anne moved to New Zealand with her husband. She continued to sing here. She met up with Cathy through singing at church, and their combination in turn led to Callanish.

Wally Robinson: Guitar, (occasional bass if we let him)

Wally is one of those naturals who keeps on smiling through all the disasters, which is either the reason, or it's paradoxical, that he plays the blues so well, which is what he was doing when Callanish found him. Wally kindly agreed to merge styles, and once he'd sorted out slip jig time, provided great accompaniment to the vagaries of pipers and fiddlers.

Peter Mason: Caller

Originally from England, Peter has been a caller for over twentyyears. He has worked with bands in Norfolk, Wiltshire and Devon in Britain. He came to New Zealand in 1996 and has been the regular caller with Callanish for the last two years. The dances Peter will call are best described as barn dances and include traditional dances as well as some of his own dances.

BILL & KATH WORSFOLD - NEW ZEALAND ROOTS/ROUTES

Bill and Kath have been playing together since 1979, but before that both had emerged musically in the Auckland folk scene, Bill performing and giving dulcimer workshops, Kath as a member of a harmony trio Room for Company. After getting together, they formed an Irish band, Napper Tandy, which was very successful for its short lifespan. In 1981 they went to Australia where they formed a mini bush band, Colonial Two-Step, and started performing in schools. They have made their living playing music and doing children's shows ever since. After 5 years they returned to New Zealand, where they continued as Colonial Two Step but also formed the Gumdiggers Bush Band to play mainly New Zealand music.

They have recently recorded two CDs of New Zealand music, some original songs by Bill and other excellent songs by "unsung heroes". Many of the songs are previously unrecorded, and others only found once in the recorded repertoire. Music of the North Auckland region is also a feature. They will be performing a number of these songs and talking about them in their concert/workshop at 10 am on Saturday in the Fletcher Hall. Come along and experience some real New Zealand roots music.

Bill & Kath are also doing a Family Fun Show on Sunday afternoon at 4 pm in the Nelson Lounge.

Susan Colien-Reid - electric fiddle player, guitarist and singer-songwriter, with a new song just released

Julian McKean - fingerstyle guitarist and singer-songwriter, ex Acoustic Confusion

Mary Campbell - guitarist, singer, songwriter, poet

Josie Campbell - guitarist, singer, songwriter; currently recording a new album "Metal Roads"

Evan Williams - drummer, ex Southside of Bombay

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TOM WALWYN

Tom, who's been in New Zealand almost a year, hails from Newcastle upon Tyne, (by naturalisation - actually born a Southerner!)

He started playing the flute at the age of 12, did all the grades, but got told off for improvising harmonies in the school orchestra and started dabbling in Irish music. Tom's interest really got off the ground when he went to university and got involved with a bunch of folkies.

Although Tom's primarily a flute player he discovered that it wasn't quite the right instrument for the dance music of central France and Brittany and ordered a set of pipes, reckoning that if that didn't work he could always sell them. So far all is well and he's loving it.

Tom plays a whole mixture of tunes - often the more subtle stuff - from Ireland, Scotland, France, Brittany. Northumbria and Sweden and elsewhere and specialises in the use of a yellow plastic food clip. As far as is known he's the only person playing two different wind instruments at the same time.

See Tom's English Border pipes, bamboo flutes and yellow plastic food clip in concert in the Maire Hall at 1.30 pm on Sunday afternoon.

MOVING CLOUD

Take a harp player from Palmerston North, a flute player from Wellington, a fiddler and a multi-instrumentalist from Auckland and an oboe player from Martinborough ... and you have a very long distance to go to rehearsals. But these musicians enjoy playing together so much they have done just that.

The musical bond was formed at numerous tune sessions at festivals around the North Island over recent years, and cemented this year when Celia Briar and Mary Hubble invited Linda Willings, Greg Whitcombe and Jenny Biber to add their considerable talents to the recording of Celia and Mary's (soon to be released) CD, "The Garden of Daisies".

The name Moving Cloud was chosen at a rehearsal in Tokaanu for the ensemble's concert at this festival. *Hear them at 4.30 pm on Sunday afternoon in the Maire Hall.* (NB this may be your last chance to catch a hurdy-gurdy in action for a while!

DANCE WORKSHOPS

EXECUTE AN EIGHTSOME with Edith Campbell

Edith Campbell was born, educated and worked in Edinburgh until, after a short spell in London, she was persuaded to emigrate to New Zealand. She has a Teacher's Certificate from The Royal Scottish Country Dance Society and has taught almost continuously since her arrival in Wellington.

The eightsome reel is a very popular dance and Edith will show us how to execute the figures and the steps so we can all go for it, to music provided by Liz Merton and Ann McChesney on Saturday afternoon at 1.00 in the Fletcher Hall.

INTERNATIONAL DANCING with Cashy Yates

Cashy started learning international folkdancing with Marcel Baajens about 11 years ago, and has been taking a weekly dance group for the past 4 years. She runs a annual international-flavoured social in the Wairarapa, and has done others in Wellington and Petone.

Cashy will be teaching a selection of dances from Greece, France, Israel, and other faraway places. The emphasis will be on sociable dances - the sort of dance you would want to join in with. The dances at this workshop will be a little more challenging than those she teaches at socials. Cashy's class is at 11.30 on Sunday in the Fletcher Hall.

BRITANNIC BEDLAM MORRIS GENTLEMEN

Britannic Bedlam Morris Gentlemen was formed in 1982 as New Zealand's first all male Morris side, at least of the modern era. Bedlam has specialised in dances originating from Headington Quarry, although they try to stamp their own style on everything they do. Dances composed by the side also feature in their repertoire, including the trademark Princess Royal.
